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On the Home Front in Wallkill during World War II

The United States tried desperately to stay out of the "European" War. President Roosevelt issued a neutrality proclamation, sent material aid to our allies, and increased defense spending, including by November 1940 registering more than 16 million men for the draft.

The country was changing, becoming more urbanized, aided by the automobile, the train, the radio, and telephones. As the cities grew, the metropolitan newspapers absorbed subscribers from rural areas, but there was still a critical contribution that kept local papers alive and essential in those anxious times.

On January 9, 1940, the front page of **The Wallkill Valley World** reported the news that **Peter Thomas Sowa** was the first local man to be called for the draft. By 1941, even though the U.S. was not yet directly in the War, each issue of the paper reported the names of the most recent draftees, 72 of them by August, including – **Fred David Lowenbaupt, Elmer Eignor, Jacob Bogen,** and **Robert Lee Cerillo,** to name a few.

Everything changed with the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.



The paper printed terse news of Roosevelt's appearance before a joint session to ask for a formal declaration of war and there was no debate.

Americans responded by contributing 16 billion dollars in War Bonds, a lot of money in those times.

Throughout the war years the local newspaper reported heartbreaking accounts of Wallkill boys, including **Sgt. John T. Scott**, 21, killed in action while fighting in New Guinea, soldiers missing in action, and soldiers in prison camps whose letters home were published on page 1.

On the local front, prisoners in the Wallkill Prison contributed blood, and bound issues of National Geographic for servicemen in veterans' hospitals. The shortage of men resulted in serious



apple picking problems: in response, Wallkill high school closed early to allow students to help with the harvest, assisted by soldiers from Stewart Field.

Meanwhile, in other news on the local front, fifteen cases of infantile paralysis were reported in Ulster County, **Margaret**

Edsall, a senior at Wallkill High, was chosen Apple Blossom Beauty Queen, the Wallkill Knights of Pythias held a Ladies' Night, and more than 175 people attended an Easter Sunrise service on the old Borden estate. Mrs. George Sherwood was named the County's champion pie baker. Two Wallkill girls – Irene McLinden and Etta Bowden were hired by the FBI after graduation from Wallkill High, and Mr. & Mrs. Amos Weld celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

On **October 2** in the Knights of Pythias House, a lively audience volunteered stories about family artifacts, including a hand-carved writing desk and items from the fondly remembered Edsall pharmacy.

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On **November 6**, through then and now photos, **Freda Fenn and Hal VanAken** highlighted changes on Wallkill's Main Street, remembering Ronk's Carriage, Gabe's Shoes, and the blacksmith, among others.

The multi-year restoration reflected the removal of years of modernization - layers of wallpaper, paint, and electrification; this effort involved construction of broken walls, molding, missing baseboards, hand-mixing milk paint, adding targeted lighting, removing non-period lighting fixtures, and nails, paint, and plain old dirt from the wooden floor...a joint effort and labor of love by Hal VanAken, Karen Dale, Bob Mooney, Libby Ross, Freda Fenn, Jim Malloy, John Ross, Paul Dale and Al White, among others.



18th Century Kitchen

The historic jelly cupboard and Dutch kas contain kitchenware from the **Mary DuBois Wright estate.** The cast-iron stove was functional in the kitchen for most of the 20th century. We invite the public to visit and enjoy a view of our shared past.
