Celebrating the 350th Anniversary of Evert Terwilliger's Arrival in the New World

On July 12-14, 2013, Terwilligers in America, Inc. held a special celebration commemorating the arrival of Evert Terwilliger to the port of Nieuw-Amersterdam; Evert and his two children sailed from Amsterdam on the De Arent (The Eagle), departing on March 15 and arriving on June 2, 1663. From that beginning, the Terwilliger family has grown to include family members across the United States. The family created Terwilligers in America, Inc. in 2010 as a non-profit corporation for sharing genealogical and family information for those interested in the family and related Terwilliger surnames. Terwilliger means Ter (near) and Williger (willows) – or near the willows.

The weekend started with a lovely reception held at the Locust Grove estate in Poughkeepsie. The Young-Morse Historical Site staff provided a tour of the Samuel Morse mansion and its beautiful grounds. Members of the Historical Society of Shawangunk & Gardiner attended the reception to meet and speak with Terwilligers from West Virginia, New Hampshire, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, New Jersey, Ohio, Vermont, and Colorado. Members from other states sent best wishes, including Grace Terwilliger, aged 103 years, the oldest member of the Terwilligers in America, who was sorely missed at the event; she has attended every reunion since its inception. Attendees were especially pleased to see Myron Terwilliger, his wife Peg, and son Paul, who brought some of his extensive collection of Terwilliger family artifacts and memorabilia. (see, p.2). The evening ended with dinner at the River Station Restaurant, which has a view of the Mid-Hudson Bridge and Walkway Over the Hudson. It was a pleasant way for old friends to reminisce and new Terwilliger family members to get to know one another.

On Saturday, July 13th, the Terwilligers had their traditional “coffee and crumbs” meeting on the porch of the Evert Terwilliger House in Gardiner. Members shared stories of their Terwilliger ancestors or

memories of past reunions, including one member who told how she met her husband at the last reunion! Dawn Elliott, who organizes events at the neighboring Locust Lawn and the Terwilliger House, spoke of ideas for future events, including pancake breakfasts, re-enactments, and living history demonstrations. After the meeting, several members drove north to Hurley for the annual Stone House Days celebration where many homes were open for tours. Christine Wade, author of *Seven Locks*, gave a short talk on her book about a Dutch family living in the Catskill Mountains around 1769 – 1800. In addition, several members spent time looking at records at the Ulster County Genealogical Society or the Ulster County Historical Society.. This was followed by the traditional Dutch Treat Dinner, held at the Hurley Mountain Inn, an old hostelry built in 1830.

On the last day, members attended the traditional worship service at the Reformed Church of Shawangunk, where a lovely service was provided by Pastor Howie. Many Terwilligers have been baptized and married in this church and several are buried in the adjacent cemetery. After the service, delicious refreshments were served in the fellowship hall.

After the service a number of Terwilligers met with Shawangunk & Gardiner Historical Society members to tour the DuBois House Museum and the Knights of Pythias House in Wallkill. Discussions took place about how the two groups can mutually support one another.

At the DuBois House, we are developing multiple options to solve a long-time leaky roof problem, a necessary precondition for grant applications. We continue with cleaning, organizing, and preparing for regular Open House visits; each Saturday visitors tour the house and hear about its history, resulting in donations and some new members. At the Knights House, we have installed a new window, completed plaster wall repair, and applied a primer coat in the general meeting room, bringing us several steps closer to using the space for our meetings.
